Course Descriptions

AR 200/300 Special Topics (Lithography)

Students will create images by drawing/painting on a flat surface (a smooth stone or metal plate). The image, once it is "etched" into the stone/metal plate, can to be printed multiple times. This is the process artists used to make posters in the late nineteenth century (Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec). Students will also learn about other great artists that used lithography as part of their visual expression. Previous experience with drawing would be helpful but is not essential for the AR 200 section.

BI 256 Human Anatomy with Lab

A study of the anatomical structure of the human body. Body structure will be studied by organ systems and will involve a balance between gross anatomical study and histology. Form-function relationships will also be emphasized. The laboratory study will involve working with human skeletal collections, models and dissections of major mammalian preserved organs. This course is a prerequisite for BI 358 Human Physiology, which will be offered in the spring semester.

CH 118 Science of Cooking

Designed for non-majors, this course is an introduction to the chemical nature of foods and the chemical and physical transformations during the preparation and cooking of foods. Topics include structure of molecules, inter- and intramolecular interactions, properties of matter, food preservation and spoilage, chemical reactions, acids and bases, thermochemistry, and gas laws, all within the context of the chemistry of cooking. Specific applications may include such topics as structures of carbohydrates, proteins and lipids; leavening and fermentation; volatility and flavor; caramelization and burned foods; phase changes; colloidal suspensions, foams, salad dressings and solubility; cooking under pressure; heat transfer and proper cooking utensils; the breakdown of molecules with heat; and safe preparation and storage of food. Lecture and laboratory. The laboratory component includes cooking and food-based experiments. No prerequisite is required. This class fulfills the general education laboratory science requirement.

CR 300 Special Topics: Fundamentals of Gangs

This course introduces students to the cultural and structural components of gang activity. It is an examination of the history of gangs, socio-psychological aspects of individual and group behavior, the major theories and socio-economic reasons as to why gangs exist. Included in this course are descriptions of all types of gangs, as well as a review of social programs and law enforcement techniques designed to combat gangs. Prerequisites: PY 150 or SO 110.

CR 330 Homeland Security

This course is designed to examine to the scope of issues facing the American public, the private sector and law enforcement on securing the country against threats posed by domestic and international terrorist groups. Threats to American interests abroad will also be analyzed.

Prerequisite: 50 110.

HI 395 The History of Genocide

This course will seek to answer four questions: What is genocide; can we identify root causes of genocide; is genocide a creation of the modern age; and what can we do to prevent genocide? Looking at the history of genocide or "race killing" the class will focus on the social, political, and diplomatic implications of a world that has perpetrated multiple genocides in the 19th and 20th centuries, often with impunity towards the perpetrators. We will also look at the legal structures that have been developed since World War II to prevent and prosecute genocide. Case studies will include: Hereros of Namibia; Armenians in Turkey; Cambodia and East Timur; Srebrenica, Bosnia; and Rwanda and Congo. This course deals with difficult topics and visuals of brutal killings of innocents including large numbers of children as well as mass rapes. The Holocaust will be discussed but is not a central focus of the class.

PSCR 302 Terrorists, Patriots and Revolutionaries

This course examines the phenomenon of global terrorism, nationalism and revolution. The course covers not only theoretical models used to examine this material, but also provides a historical view of each phenomenon. The course focuses on identifying possible political interventions that would place the world community with the best results. Prerequisite: SO 110.

PH 480 Philosophy ot Sport

This class examines prevailing philosophical ideas concerning the meaning, function and purpose of sport throughout history and contemporary society. This is not SportsCenter, nor is it a history of sport. But the course will employ on contemporary case studies and examples to look at several key ethical issues (performance enhancing drugs, cheating, race and sexual relations in sport). We will also look at how sports and games in general tell us about ourselves, the world around us and our ideals and also how they might conflict with other ideals we hold dear.

PY 500 Advanced Studies: Neuropsychology

This course is designed to introduce the student to the field of neuropsychology – the study of the brain's effect on behavior and mental processes. Included will be anatomy and basic function of the brain, emphasis on the psychological effects of brain damage. Students will also gain an understanding of the typical assessment tools and procedures for diagnosing neuropsychological malfunctions. Specific areas will include cognition, memory, spatial processing, emotion, split-brain, hemispherectomy, ataxia, and toxic solvents. Knowledge and content will be presented via case studies. Pre-requisite: Six hours in psychology.

TH 300 Christian Thought in the Wild and Wacky Middle Ages

This course examines (primarily) Western historical theology from about 500-1500 C.E. Using both primary and secondary sources, it examines medieval Christianity from several rich, interrelated vantage points: the development of the institutional church and its doctrines, church-state relations, spiritual renewal movements, religious charisms and the daily life of ordinary Christians. Prerequisite: One 100 or 200 level Theology course.

TH 304 Topics in Scripture: Knowing Jesus Christ through the Letters of Paul

The Letters of Paul were the first writings of the New Testament. This course will explore how Paul proclaimed Jesus Christ as the Gospel, the Good News to all people, even before the Gospels were written. A brief overview of the religion, culture and society of Jewish and Greco-Roman world provide a background for Paul's teaching. Through a close reading of Paul's Epistles, many themes emerge, including: our life in Christ, the challenge of Christian community, the source of our salvation and redemption, the gift of faith, forgiveness, and always, God's overwhelming Love . Prerequisite: 100 or 200 level Theology course.

TH 275 The Christian Imagination

Christianity has provided rich ground for the imagination. This course explores ways in which, for 2000 years, the arts have enabled believers to respond creatively to the Christian message. It raises questions about why Christian spirituality flourishes through the use of media such as images, music, literature, and film. It also gives students the tools necessary to "read" works of art from a variety of periods, including our own, and to understand the role that the arts play in the devotional sphere, as well as the theological views that underpin the works we will study. The course will sensitize student to the essential role of the imagination in human life.
